On June 27 we'll spend the day in the Scranton area visiting the Electric City Trolley Museum (see article by John Wissinger at page 10) that includes a ride into the countryside, a back shop tour of their maintenance facility, and a tour of one of two coal mines. John is our Project Officer for this event. Then on July 25 Fred Kurtz is our Project Officer for a visit to the Reading Railroad Heritage Museum in Hamburg PA. Later that afternoon we'll ride the Wanamaker, Kempton, & Southern Railroad, also known as the Hawk Mountain Line. We'll end the day with a visit to the WK&S Model Railroad Club thanks to club and NMRA member Dennis Blank. Both of these great events require pre-registration – the associated forms and fees will be outlined in an early April Sidetracks Express issue.

You will soon receive a Division-wide survey. Please take the few minutes needed to complete it and help us understand your desires, where you believe we're doing well, and where we can improve our service to you. We are particularly interested in hearing from those of you who live in the outer areas of our far flung Division. And please let us know what type of events you would like to see offered in the future and hopefully your willingness to help develop such programs. I thank you in advance for providing your thoughtful responses.

We held our first event of the year on February 7 in Mechanicsburg – see Ron Smith's article on page 5. Unlike last year's meeting, the weather this year was excellent and 42 members and visitors attended both the morning clinics and afternoon layout visits. Many thanks to those of you who attended; also to Grace United Methodist Church for their excellent facility and to Ron Smith for handling all the arrangements. If you did not attend you missed the test flight of our new Division TV camera system where the close-in details of Jody Gontero's weathering clinic and other happenings were projected on a large screen for all to see. The new system provided everyone with front-row like seats. We also had a special guest in attendance – Martin Brechbiel who is a Mid-East Region Director and their Contest Committee Chairman. We surely appreciate all the support and encouragement Martin has provided our Division.

Although a glance outside may not support my statement that June is just around the corner but the calendar says it's just 4 months away. So what's so big about June? It's when we elect four BOD Directors for a two-year term of duty. The seats currently held by the following BOD members are up for election – Howard Oakes (also Membership Chairman), Ron Parisi, Lee Rainey, and David Collision. The four elected Directors will serve a two-year tour from July 1, 2015 to June 30, 2017. Your BOD sets the annual event program, selects project officers for each approved event, and manages the day to day Division business. We hold two in-person BOD meetings per year – one in the spring and one in August where we begin developing the next year's event plan. All routine business is handled either by phone or email. Please seriously consider tossing your name in the hat and volunteer to run for a Director position. Bottom line – it's your Division and the Programs presented are developed by your BOD. Join our leadership team and help guide the future of your Division. Detailed nomination procedures and voting timeline will be included in an early April Sidetracks Express.

We have a continuing problem contacting our 250+ members. 



Our first Division event of 2015 was held at Grace UMC in Mechanicsburg the first Saturday of February. This was the second consecutive year for this meeting time and location, so we may be establishing an annual event! Not only did the Project Officer for the event (me) figure out how to use the thermostat in the room, attendees were also able to use the brand new elevator that was recently added to the church. It definitely came in handy for our friends from Task Force 50 of York, who brought several large ship models for display and discussion.



There were 42 attendees for the meeting. After a gathering time to share coffee and donuts and look over the models, the meeting opened with our annual Business Meeting. Barry Schmitt provided the group with information on how our membership is spread out amongst 32 counties and the head counts within those counties. He also presented information about the upcoming BOD elections, and a request for nominations. There was also a summary of our 2015 event schedule.

Our first clinician was Jan Hagen-Frederikson, a fairly new NMRA member who models the Danish State Railways. Jan provided a very interesting discussion on the topic, as well as a historical perspective and his family ties to the railroad. Jan's son Nils was also in attendance, and they hosted our group as part of the afternoon layout tours. The photos of the ferry operations were particularly fascinating. Jan and Nils are modeling the historic train station and shed in Copenhagen, and presented slides and a video of their project.

The next clinician was Jody Gontero, who provided a demonstration of his weathering techniques. New this time was the first use of our Division's recently-acquired video camera, which was a great assist to Jody's presentation as folks in the back of the room could easily see the presentation on the video screen at the front of the room. Many thanks to Dave Collison for his procurement and setup of the camera – it should get a lot of use in the coming years. Note, Barry informed us that the MER contributed half of the cost of the camera, so a hearty thank you to the MER as well!

The final presentation of the morning was the Model Showcase segment, shepherded by John Wissinger, MMR. There were 33 models displayed; 14 members and guests stood up and spoke briefly about what they brought. The railroad model scales ran from N scale to O scale. Models on display included 6 cabooses of various prototypes, a diesel locomotive, a Schnable oversized load car, a PRR wreck train, loads on a flat car, 2 Branchline kit flag stop waiting shelters, a 1900s house, all in HO scale. In N scale were a PRR scale house and crossing elevated watchman's tower and a station. In O scale were 3 freight cars and a mockup of a coal mine. In On30 was a narrow gauge rail bus. A unique non-railroad model was a "rapid prototype" 3D-printed model of a bus that ran on a buried wire in the street. The segment was closed out by Task Force 50, a group of radio-control ship modelers from York who brought in six 1/8<sup>th</sup> inch scale models of WW II-era navy ships. The ship models on display were models of an LST, cruiser, destroyer, hospital ship, aircraft carrier and destroyer. These models were highly detailed and exhibited excellent craftsmanship. The largest was a 9-foot long model of the aircraft carrier Shangri-La. The members spoke about their modeling techniques, and the challenges and advantages of working in 1/96 scale. These models were a big hit with the attendees.

The Model Showcase portion of the meeting is popular with more models and people taking part, but it would be nice to have even more models and people displaying their work. So for the next meeting, bring a model to show. Everyone in the division has something to talk about so bring it to the next meeting.



This is an event that will introduce you to all facets of ride-on outdoor steam railroading. Please annotate your spring schedule now and plan to attend an event that will provide an in depth introduction to this unique hobby.

The day begins at 9 AM with a visit to Wayne Godshall's 5000 square foot custom machine shop located in Shermans Dale, PA. Godshall's Custom Machining is a full-service machine shop that specializes in both general machine services and the Live Steam hobby. One of Wayne's major projects is the offering of an almost ready to run kit for a 1.6" scale PRR H-10 live steam locomotive. You will see several of the H-10 projects during a tour of his shop as well as a Big Boy under construction.

After lunch we will re-assemble at 1 PM at Don Sweger's Tuscarora Valley Railroad (TVR) in Ickesburg, PA. Don built and operates a 1.5" scale railroad consisting of a yard, engine steam up facilities, and approximately 6200 feet of mainline track. He and a friend built and operate a 1.5" scale PRR K-4 and matching passenger cars. A large portion of visiting equipment is steam operated and there have been as many as 6 different classes of Pennsy steam in operation at the same time. If you want to see and hear PRR steam in operation, this is the place to visit. Following an introduction to the railroad by Don, train rides will be given. We are hoping to have several steam locomotives (PRR or other roads) in operation for the event.

The address for Godshall's Custom Machining is 4614 Valley Road, Shermans Dale, PA. Valley Road is the same as Route 850 that runs between Marysville and Shermans Dale. Don's Tuscarora Railroad is located in Ickesburg, next to the firehouse, on Route 17. The firehouse is located just north of the intersection on Routes 17 and 74. Turning west onto Railroad Lane off of route 17 brings you right to the railroad. Maps to each location will be provided to all registered attendees.

For lunch there is the Bear's Den Pizza Shop on the outskirts of Ickesburg. Also, for those who wish to picnic, there is the Little Buffalo Park just outside of Newport. There is railroad history associated with the park as the Newport and Sherman's Valley Railroad passed through this area in the early 1900's. The railroad ran from New Germantown to Newport where it connected with the PRR. The park is also home to an operational water powered mill. There are picnic tables and a short walking trail on the old Newport and Sherman's Valley rail bed. See their website for more details.

This event is mostly outside so dress accordingly. Attendance at the event will be by pre-registration only. Registration instructions are on the following page; you may photocopy it, fill it out and send it in. Cost is \$2 for NMRA members, \$2 for family, and \$5 for non-NMRA members. This event will be held rain or shine, although some of the outdoor activities may be limited due to weather conditions.

## Trip to Scranton PA, Electric City and Anthracite Coal Mine and Museum

Date: Saturday June 27, 2015

The NMRA Susquehanna Division has arranged for tours for the following museums in the Scranton area. These are preregistration/prepay tours. A registration form is being developed and will be sent out in early April.

Tour #1 Electric City, Lackawanna County Coal Mine Tour and Museum Tour Scranton PA

Tour #2 Electric City, Pioneer Tunnel Coal Mine and Steam Train ride and Museum Tour Ashland PA

Tour #3. Electric City only, Steamtown on your own.

The tours consists of a morning tour of Electric City Trolley Museum, lunch on your own and a choice of afternoon tours of either of two Anthracite Coal Mines and Anthracite Museums or you may visit Steamtown on your own which is directly across the parking lot from Electric City.

**Electric City** (starting point for the tours) has many displays regarding electric traction technology, with several trolley and interurban cars in various states of preservation and other displays regarding the electric railroad industry. Included is an interurban/trolley 10 mile round trip ride on an electric interurban on the former Laurel Line electric interurban railroad and on the former Erie RR. The Laurel Line (Lackawanna and Wyoming Valley RR) had an extensive electric freight service in addition to the passenger service. The trip goes through a 4,700 ft. tunnel and past several former railroad sites. There is a gift shop where you can buy trolley and railroad books and related items.

**Lunch** is on your own. There is a food court in the Steamtown Mall which is just north of the museums and is accessible via a pedestrian bridge over the Steamtown railroad yard, a good place to take pictures of the outdoor storage of Steamtown. There are other restaurants in the downtown area of Scranton. The coal mine museums have small lunch counters and seating areas or you can brown bag it and eat in the parks across from the mines.

### Tour #1

**Electric City, Lackawanna County Coal Mine Tour and Museum Tour** Scranton (mine tour starts after lunch). The tour is 1-1/2 hour long. A 10-15 minute decent into the mine is via cable operated mine train and then a 45 minute walking tour of the mine showing various coal seams and an explanation of how coal is mined is given by the guide.

**Anthracite Heritage Museum** is on the site and is a guided tour lasting 1 hour with an additional 15 minute film on Anthracite coal mining and life in the mining towns. Driving time from Electric City is 10-15 minutes.

#### Tour #2

**Electric City, Pioneer Tunnel Coal Mine and Steam Train ride and Museum Tour** Ashland PA (mine tour starts after lunch). The mine is a horizontal drift mine 1800 feet into the mountain. The tour is in mine cars pulled by a battery powered mine "motor." Then a guided walking tour of the mine showing various coal seams and an explanation of how coal is mined is given by the guide. The tour is 35 minutes.

**Steam Train Ride**. A 0-4-0T narrow gauge steam engine pulls several converted mine cars ¾ mile along the mountain side to a strip mine where a description of strip mining is given. Across the valley is Centralia, site of the underground mine fire.

**Ashland Anthracite Museum**. Self-guided tour of a city owned museum. Time  $\frac{1}{2}$  hr. to 2 hrs. Driving time from Electric City south: 1hr 20 min.

### Electric City only, Steamtown on your own.

## **Interchangeable Backdrop Flats**

Given the lack of space available on my home shelf layout, I've come up with a simple solution to help keep the layout from becoming stale over time. Background buildings or flats are a good way to add depth to a shallow layout as well as break up a monotonous backdrop. Taking things a step farther, I devised a way to easily change my background buildings around. Being able to change industries on the fly allows me to change car spots and car types required for the industry quickly and easily.



A few years back, I came across a small advertisement for Kingmill Enterprises Radical Flats background buildings. Their web site can be found at <a href="www.kingmill.com">www.kingmill.com</a> and is user-friendly. The concept is fairly simple; the backdrops are retouched photos of actual buildings which are printed on a sheet of 80lb 11"x17" cardstock for the HO version (8.5"x11" in N scale). These background buildings are among the most realistic looking that I have seen on the market. I often get comments from others asking what kit I used to build the background building in the photo of my layout they saw online. Most of the flats can be built into three dimensional cardstock buildings with sidewalls and roofs if you wish. For my purpose, I have kept the buildings in their flat state.





The first step is to mount the cardstock sheets onto a stiff backer material. At first, I used black foam core board that is commonly available at the major craft stores- AC Moore, Michaels, Hobby Lobby, etc. While this material does work, I found that it tends to warp once you attach the cardstock to one side with spray adhesive. My solution to the problem was to use black Gatorfoam. Gatorfoam looks just like foam core, but instead of paper on the outside surface, a thin wood veneer is bonded to each side of the inner core. Sign shops have used this material for years, since it is dimensionally more stable when exposed to humidity and more durable overall than traditional foam core board. Local sign shops may be willing to sell you the raw Gatorfoam, but I purchased mine from foamboardsource.com. This company also sells on eBay. I chose to use 3/16" thick black Gatorfoam material that was precut to 11"x17", but you could choose a thicker size if you would like to add more depth, or vary the depth of the buildings in your scene. The company I purchased from sells the Gatorfoam in a wide variety of precut sizes and thicknesses.



There are three different types of Gatorfoam available that would be suitable for this job. First is the regular material with the natural surface on both sides. This is the least expensive option, but you will need to invest in some spray adhesive to attach the cardstock to the Gatorfoam. The instructions specifically state not to use white glue, as it will cause the paper to curl. The second type of Gatorfoam available has one side of the board treated with a heat activated adhesive. The third, and most expensive option, has one side of the board pre-treated with a self-sticking adhesive that requires no heat to cure. I chose the heat curing adhesive for my project. The price difference was marginal over the uncoated boards, and I did not have to worry about using smelly, messy spray adhesive to attach each sheet to the Gatorfoam. A 10-pack of black 11"x17"x3/16" thick Gatorfoam with heat activated adhesive was around \$58 shipped for 10 pieces.

To attach the backdrops to the foam, I placed each sheet of cardstock on the adhesive-coated side of the Gatorfoam, then placed a sheet of plain white paper on top as a buffer. I then used an ordinary clothing iron set to "cotton" setting to activate the adhesive. Go slowly, but keep the iron moving at all times...you don't want to burn the cardstock underneath.



Once the glue has set, you can cut out your buildings from the rest of the sheet using a hobby knife and a straight edge. This material will dull your blades quickly, so change blades often and be careful. I found it works better to make a cut using several light scores as opposed to trying to cut the entire thickness at once.

Once the building has been removed from the sheet, you can retouch the white edges of the cardstock with a black or brown sharpie marker. Hold the marker from the back side of the building and use the edge of the tip to prevent accidentally slipping and marking up the finished building.





Next, I glue a metal strip to the back of each building 2" on center from the base. For the strip, I used some metal skid strapping that I dug out of the scrap hopper where I work. Any warehouse or lumber yard should have some of this strapping laying around and will be free for the taking, as long as you ask. I cut the metal strips to the width of the building flat and glued them on using 5 minute epoxy.




To make the flats removable and repositionable, I attached 10mm round x 1mm thick rare earth magnets into my foam core backdrop every 6-12 inches. There are a plethora of these magnets available on eBay for reasonable prices. I purchased 50 pieces for \$6.99 shipped from eBay seller "kunkunh2009". I then glued the magnets in place with 5 minute epoxy. Standard magnets would probably work fine also, but I like the strength of the rare earth magnets because they can be quite thin, but strong enough to pull some warp out of your building flat, should any develop over time.





Once everything is dry, you can now change out your background buildings quickly and easily. Here is an example of how you can quickly change a scene in seconds using these reconfigurable background flats:
