From the Superintendent's Desk - Tim Himmelberger

When I was asked to consider running for the Superintendent position part of me was hoping that there would be a grass roots ABT (Anybody But Tim) uprising. However that has not happened. So as your new Superintendent let me take some time to introduce myself. I am the Product Manager for Kercher Industries. Our primary product line is High Intensity mixers. They are primarily used in the Ceramics and refractory industries. We also produce low shear mixers, which now are primarily used in laboratory work. The other major product line is a machine which makes molded brick. The idea is to automate the process of making hand-molded brick. In the brick industry it is a small but high end niche market. For those of you who attended the Quakertown meeting you had a chance to hear my clinic on modeling a brick plant. I have been to many brick plants and know enough about the process to know what you can do to make a viable looking model.

I have an associate degree in Mechanical Engineering Technology. In the past I have held various positions at Church including: Chair of Administrative Council, Treasurer, and Lay Delegate to Annual Conference. I was a Scoutmaster for about 5 years and have earned my Wood Badge.

As a kid we would start setting up our HO trains on Thanksgiving Day every year. They would be up until sometime in January when my Mom would like to have the room back. When Josh, my son, expressed interest in modeling we were working on a HO shelf switching layout hand laying code 70 track. While he was in high school it sat dormant so due to the pressure from my wife for the space it was dismantled and packed away. When our 2nd grandson was born my wife suggested that I set up the trains again (though she now denies it!). That was 9 years ago. My daughter has since had her 3rd son so we now have 3 grandsons. The basis for our layout was done with the boys in mind - allowing them to see trains run. Young boys are not interested in operation. In the interim Josh has moved back home from Connecticut. The layout has been expanded, but we are not happy with it - we would like a layout which will provide better opportunities for operation. However Mark the youngest grandson is 5. If we would attempt to do anything right now, Josh and I would both loose our favored position with Mark. So for now we will use the current layout for trying different modeling techniques so you can say it is our test layout. The current layout uses code 83 track. We are both Pennsy fans and are modeling the transition era. As a kid I lived in Mountville one block from the Columbia branch back when it was still 2 tracks with high wire. From there we moved to President Ave in Lancaster, where we were close to the Dillerville yard and I made many trips over the foot bridge.

Moving forward I was interested in the results of last year's survey. What I discovered was that I am very typical of most of our members who responded: I enjoy the clinics. I'm always interested in improving my modeling skills. I enjoy the layout tours, as you never know where you will get a good idea. After all imitation is the sincerest form of flattery. And, I enjoy fellowship with other modelers. The chance to make new friendships with other modelers and to exchange ideas is very rewarding.

Since joining the NMRA I have had the opportunity to make many friendships and have enjoyed them all. But I have also enjoyed the variety of activities. However, being a mechanical manufacturing guy I especially enjoyed the Live steam manufacturing tour and the hobby suppliers' plant tours. I am looking forward to my time to serve you as your Superintendent and the opportunity of working with you!

Greeting Fellow Members

One significant BOD accomplishment since 2012 has been the number and variety of top quality events offered. It all began in 2013 with a commitment to develop an annual event program each fall and presenting that event schedule in our Jan Sidetracks. The BOD also set a goal of presenting events throughout our large Division. Below are a few of my favorite events and the dedicated project officers who made them possible:

- May 2013 joint meet with the Mid Central Region Keystone Division held at the Altoona Association of Model Railroaders club and managed by member Forrest Lucas. How did he arrange that run-by of steam loco 611?!
- ➤ June 2014 an exceptional visit to the East Broad Top (EBT) Railroad and Rockhill Trolley Museum in Orbisonia led by BOD member Lee Rainey.
- July 2014 BOD member Howard Oakes led a fantastic tour of Bowser Manufacturing and English Model Railroad Supply in Montoursville and Weaver Manufacturing and Scalecoat Paints in Northumberland.
- ➤ Sep 2014 Model Railroad Day at the Strasburg Pennsylvania Railroad Museum led by project officer Rich Wurst, his team of 13 hard-working volunteers, and great museum staff. Over 850 visitors attended.
- May 2015 project officer Dan Horting arranged visits 2 fascinating live steam facilities a large machine shop where several locomotives were in various stages of build and the 10-acre live steam Tuscarora Valley Railroad.
- ➤ June 2015 project officer John Wissinger (MMR) arranged a great visit to the Electric City Trolley Museum in Scranton and an afternoon deep underground tour of the Pioneer Tunnel Coal Mine in Ashland.
- > July 2015 project officers Fred Phillips and Fred Kurtz presented an all-day tour of the Reading Railroad Heritage Museum in Hamburg.

- ➤ May 2016 project officer Howard Oakes led morning clinics at the restored Quakertown Railroad Station, arranged discounts at the across-the-tracks J&D Whistle Stop hobby shop, and afternoon visits to 5 exceptional layouts.
- ➤ June 2016 member Dan Horting presented a very educational and enjoyable Live Steam Day at the 5-acre PA Live Steamers club in Collegeville.

Four other hugely successful programs have been annual mainstays since 2012 – BOD member Ron Smith's Feb morning clinics and afternoon layout visits; Assistant Super Wayne Betty's management of our popular operations-till-you-drop weekend LSOP program; Ron Smith's leadership of the Sep Mainline Hobby weekend open house program; and our Nov Division-wide layout open house program in support of National Model Railroad Month managed by Lee Rainey, Charles Kadyk, and Jerry Britton.

As you well know our Division successes are due to the hard work of many members. Besides the great event project officers named above several others were key Division leaders these past 4 years: Ron Smith, Editor of our superb bi-monthly Sidetracks; our Chief Clerk (money bags) Paul Tice who has held that position since the Division was founded in the mid-1980s; BOD member David Collison who led our recent purchase of badly needed audio visual equipment; Bob Charles (MMR), NMRA President for many years, our Achievement Program manager, and Chairman of our upcoming Oct 2017 MER Convention - The Susquehannock; Howard Oakes, our Membership Chairman who led our expansion from 238 members in 2012 to 268 last month; and member Bill Lesjak and his wonderful wife Loraine who have managed our registration desk at every event as far back as I can remember. 
September 17-18 Mainline Hobby Supply Open House


Seeking Layouts for Susquehannock Convention

Did you know?

Historic Rockville Bridge

Marysville is the proud home of the historic Rockville Bridge. The bridge is 3,823 feet long – the longest stone masonry arch railroad bridge in the world!! Construction of the Rockville Bridge began simultaneously on the east and west shores of the Susquehanna River in 1900. Italian stone masons and Irish laborers completed construction on the 48-arch bridge on March 30, 1902. The bridge was opened for traffic on Easter Sunday morning, with the first train being the Atlantic Express, No. 20, with D16a 4-4-0 engine No. 30 doing the honors. Constructed to accommodate four tracks, it was reduced to three in the late 1900's. The bridge is constructed of native sandstone from western Pennsylvania, primarily from quarries in Johnstown and Curwensville. Total weight is 440 million pounds (220,000 tons). Each of the 48 arches is 70 feet long. Bridgeview Bed & Breakfast has lodging available with a view the Rockville Bridge.

One of the newest additions to the list of operating steam locomotives in PA belongs to the Everett RR, based in Hollidaysburg (a few miles south of Altoona). In November 2015 the railroad unveiled their recently-restored # 11, the former Bath & Hammondsport # 11.


After a nearly 30-year career in revenue freight service for the Narragansett Pier and the Bath & Hammondsport Railroads, in 1949 the # 11 was retired by the B&H -replaced by a GE 44-tonner. Stored until 1955, #11 was sold to a private owner, marking the beginning of her new career in tourist service. Stored since the 1970's for another 30 year period; restoration began in 2006 and was completed in 2015.







Quakertown May 14 Event – Wrap Up

Division 11 held its spring event on Saturday May 14 in the beautifully restored Quakertown Train Station. 37 members and guests attended including several from the NMRA Philadelphia division. The MER's AP chairman Charlie Flichman MMR was also in attendance.

In his opening remarks Superintendent Barry Schmitt discussed the upcoming Division 11 elections, the June 26 live steam event, the September Mainline Hobby and the November Division 11 open house events, and the status of the MER convention (The Susquehannock) which will be hosted by the Susquehanna Division on October 12-15, 2017. Bob Charles MMR, the convention chairman, spoke briefly about some of the planned convention activities. Watch for details in upcoming issues of Sidetracks.

The morning program began with a short talk by Don Fenstermacher who is the president of the Quakertown Train Station Historical Society. Don discussed the history of the station, who built and owned it, the fire and reconstruction, current operation and future plans. Find out more about this station at http://www.quakertowntrainstation.org/.

David Long, president of the Coopersburg Area Society of Model Engineers C.A.S.M.E., gave a presentation on the origins of the club which began with a merger of two clubs. The East Penn Model R.R. Club from Emmaus, PA lost their location and the Bux-Mont Model Engineers from Quakertown PA needed a space to set up their HO modules. The current location is in the Coopersburg Borough Building and the club has been building the layout for 10 years. Dave talked about how they developed their track plan, location and era modeled, operations that can include up to 2 dozen operators at one time, membership, DCC system, scenery, challenges and upcoming plans. This 2 level layout, with a third level for staging, is a must see. Visit their website www.casme.org for upcoming open house events.

After a short break Division 11's Tim Himmelberger presented a clinic on modeling a brick plant. He began by looking at the history of brick plants, the brick making process start to finish, and how plants have changed over the years. He discussed what kits are available to construct a realistic plant, as well as what modifications would be necessary to adjust the model to your era. He offered suggestions on how can you compress a large modern brick plant to fit on your layout. If you are interested in modeling a brick plant, contact Tim as he has extensive knowledge of the entire operation.

The Model Showcase portion of the program featured 4 presenters. Tim Himmelberger brought several models of the brick operation, Bill Lesjak showed a nicely done laser kit, Scott Unger displayed a wooden retaining wall and Dennis Blank has an incredibly lighted diesel engine with several LEDs.

Rounding out the morning was a door prize drawing for 6 items. Before departing the station area several attendees visited the J&D Whistle Stop hobby store just across the tracks at 106 E. Broad St. http://www.jdwhistle.com/

The afternoon featured tours of 3 club and 2 home layouts:

- The <u>Keystone N-Trak</u> permanent layout in Dublin is a double tracked modern era layout. There is a large yard, several industries for switching and a staging area. Scenery is mostly complete; control is by Digitrax with some members using their smartphones as a throttle. http://www.keystonentrak.us/
- The <u>Coopersburg Area Society of Model Engineers</u> in Coopersburg was discussed in a morning clinic. This relatively new layout has most track installed, working signals and scenery is complete in several areas. They also have a humongous helix and return loop area which makes the whole layout operation viable. Visit their website and take a virtual tour. http://www.casme.org/
- The <u>Lehigh & Keystone Valley Model Railroad Museum</u> in Bethlehem is a 4,000 sq. ft. double deck operating layout. The layout models the Lehigh Valley, Reading, and the CNJ Railroads with several prototypical scenes and buildings. The museum is open one Sunday per month from March through October. The other months feature several open weekends for their holiday open house schedule. Visit their website at http://lvlou04.webspawner.com/ for more information.
- The home layout of <u>Larry Reynolds</u> is a joy for PRR fans as they watch trains travel from Huntingdon PA to Tunnelhill PA. The mostly 4 track mainline includes highlights of the Altoona facilities. The early 1950's era features steam and diesel locomotives. <u>Larry's website at http://pamodelrailroads.com/lreynolds/ has a track plan plus many photos.</u>
- Jim Hertzog Reading Shamokin Division is always a pleasure to visit. The steam to diesel transition era of 1952-1957 provides for plenty of action and variety on the double tracked mainline. You know you are in coal country when you see all the coal mines and breakers on the layout. And he has real anthracite coal scattered around the layout. 
