







- **3.** Does your layout have a specific era and/or location? The layout represents the 1950's in the area surrounding Newark and Hillside, New Jersey.







- What is the overall dimensions of your layout? The layout measures 25' X 35'.

- When did you first begin construction of your layout? I began building the layout in 2008.








- 7. Do you sponsor Operating Sessions on your layout? No, I don't. The layout was not designed for operations.

10. If you were to brag about your layout, what would you describe as its outstanding feature(s)? My layout serves as a reminder of the past and memories of my childhood.







Round the Curve to Altoona Convention Clinics Program

The Mid-Eastern Region of the NMRA will be sponsoring their yearly regional convention in Altoona, PA from October 19-21, 2023. The Susquehanna Division will be the host and organizer of a wide range of model railroad events and activities.

Previous newsletter articles highlighted the hotel, conference rooms and banquet facilitates at the convention site; outside activities including a trip/ride on the East Broad Top Railroad and Western Maryland Scenic Railroad and a visit and back shop tour of the Railroaders Memorial Museum (including an up close view of the refurbishment of PRR K4 #1361); the Convention Model Railroad Contest program open to all attendees who wish to have their workmanship adjudicated; description and offering of several Operation Sessions hosted by nearby private model railroad layouts; and most recently, a directory of numerous Open House Tours describing the private and public model railroads to visit. That leaves the last component of the convention to tout.......the clinics program!


The Round the Curve to Altoona Convention will be headquartered in the Altoona Grand Hotel. Besides being a location for overnight convention participants, conference rooms, banquet hall, contest room, company store and registration/information desk will also be on-site.

All of the sponsored clinics will be centered in three conference rooms. We have named the clinic rooms and the contest room after notable PRR loco-

motives. The clinic rooms are named the K4 Clinic Room, the T1 Clinic Room and the GG1 Clinic Room. The contest room has been named the E6 Contest Room. The locations of these, and other rooms can be seen in Figure 1.

The current schedule of clinics includes Make-N-Take work sessions, regular one-hour clinics, two hour extended clinics and special presentations by the Everett Railroad and the Allegheny Portage Railroad National Historic Site. Also featured will be nationally known authors and modelers.

The complete current schedule for Thursday, Friday and Saturday is included for your prusal. It can be found on pages 20-22. Here are some of the great clinic offerings presently scheduled for the convention:

Make-N-Take Clinics

TinkerCAD Introduction

<u>TinkerCad</u> will be presented by Kurt Thompson MMR. This double session clinic will teach the basics of TinkerCad. This 3D modeling (free of charge) program runs in a web browser and is well-suited for designing model railroad structures, parts, accessories, etc. TinkerCad requires pre-registration and participants must supply their own laptop. This no-fee clinic is offered on Friday, October 20th from 7-9 PM in the GG1 Clinic Room.

Make-N-Take Natural Scenery

<u>Natural Scenery</u> will be presented by Jane Clarke, a knowledgeable and highly praised modeler. This single session make-n-take clinic intends to teach the techniques for making scenery using materials from your own backyard. This no-fee clinic requires pre-registration. It is offered on Thursday, October 19th from 7-8 PM in the T1 Clinic Room.

Make-N-Take Ipswich Hobbies' Tool Shed

<u>Ipswich Hobbies Tool Shed</u> will be presented by Jack Dziadul. Jack will lead participants through step-by-step assembly of Ipswich Hobbies' Tool Shed, a laser cut model kit of a Southern Railway (Cape Fear & Yadkin Valley) speeder shed that once served the railroad in Goldston, North Carolina. This is a simple kit to build and will add realistic detail to any scale model railroad. Beginners will get their feet wet in building craftsman kits and more experienced modelers will have an opportunity to add a prototype structure for additional detail on their layout. Skills learned include following instructions, distressing basswood, adding details, and weathering with stains and powders. The kit is available in N, HO and O scales. Fee required: \$15 N-Scale, \$25 HO-Scale, \$45 O Scale. Preregistration is required for this double session clinic which is offered on Friday, October 20th from 7-9:30 PM in the T1 Clinic Room.

Getting a Freight Car Kit Ready for Your Layout Make-and-Take

<u>Getting a Freight Car Kit Ready for your Layout</u> will be presented by Kevin O'Connor, a highly respected modeler and frequent clinician. This make-n-take clinic will focus on getting that kit you just picked up at the last train show, swap meet, purchased on eBay or was gifted ready to run on your layout. A short presentation will be followed by each participant receiving either an Athearn, Accurail, or Roundhouse HO scale 40' or 50' boxcar. When the clinic is concluded, the boxcar will meet your requirements to run on your layout. Participants should bring the following tools: screw driver set, file set, #11 blade knife, ruler (either scale or standard), needle nose pliers, ACC and styrene glue. The following should be brought if you have them: a small portable scale that measures ounces, Kadee coupler height gauge and graphite tube. Metal wheels, couplers, and weights will be provided. This double session clinic requires pre-registration and a \$12 fee. It will be offered on Friday, October 20th from 9:30 AM-12 PM in the T1 Clinic Room.

Guest Presenters

Alan Maples- Alan is the owner and CEO of the Everett Railroad Company in Hollidaysburg, PA (just a short drive from Altoona). The history of the railroad dates back to 1954 when it was established to take over a portion of the Huntington & Broad Top Mountain Railroad and Coal Company near Everett, PA. In 1995, Alan Maples purchased the railroad and began a series of expansions and improvements. Today the corporation not only runs tourist trains (headed by a refurbished 2-6-0 and a recently built station), but also hauls local freight as a short line. Alan will present highlights of operations and invite interested conventioneers to visit and ride his railroad.





Doug Bosley- Doug is the Chief of Interpretation and Visitor Services/Site Manager assigned to the Allegheny Portage Railroad National Historic Site in Gallitzin, PA (short drive from Altoona). Doug is an authority on the historic canal systems of Pennsylvania and, in particular, the Allegheny Portage Railroad. This unique railroad was an integral link in the canal system which transported goods from canal boats over the Allegheny Mountains on rails and back down to canal boats where the journey continued to Pittsburgh or Philadelphia. Doug's presentation will not only be informative but will generate a desire to visit the historic site and experience the days of portage railroading.

Special Clinic Presenters

Andrew Dodge MMR- Andrew is a Master Model Railroader who has gained a wealth of knowledge and developed outstanding modeling skills over the years. He is a frequent clinic presenter and author of numerous model railroading magazine features. Andrew will present clinics on constructing Plexiglas structures, modeling to prototype standards and operations, and re-configuring a layout from one locale to another.

Bernie Kempinski MMR- Bernie is a Master Model Railroader who has been featured in <u>Model Railroader</u> magazine's "Meet the Modeler: Bernie Kempinski". He is an authority on Civil War railroading and even portrays a Union Colonel at some events. In addition to being a published author, Bernie also owns and manages the Alkem Scale Model Company. Bernie's clinics will cover 'manifest destiny' and waterfront terminal operations.

Lee Rainey- Lee is the noted historian of the East Broad Top Railroad. His text book about the history and operations of the railroad is still sought after by railroad history buffs. Lee was instrumental in organizing and leading the Friends of the East Broad Top Railroad for many years. Lee will present a clinic entitled "East Broad Top 101".

Lance Mindheim- Lance is a frequent contributor to the railroad hobby press. In addition to his numerous writings, he designs custom layout buildings, layout design services and personal consulting. Lance will be presenting clinics on model railroading as art and layout design principles.

Jeff Witt- Jeff is a well-known chronicler of John Allen's Gorre & Daphetid Railroad. He manages the website https://gdlines.org/ which presents the "Gorre & Daphetid Remembrance Project" where all things about the G & D and John Allen can be seen. Jeff will offer three different clinics about this historic layout and its forward-thinking creator. If you are a John Allen fan these presentations will just overwhelm you with information.

New Audio/Visual Policy

The Mid-Eastern Region's Board of Directors have recently developed and enacted a new policy for A/V at their regional conventions. Gone is the day of the host Division begging and borrowing screens, video projectors, microphones, speakers, etc. from nearby Divisions so the local convention could have adequate hardware to support clinician's presentations. Starting with the Round the Curve to Altoona Convention, the MER has purchased laptops, projectors, and screens which will assist clinicians as they present their programs. This policy has been implemented to avoid major and minor compatibility issues experienced at past conventions. David Ellis, a newly elected Director of the Susquehanna Division, has volunteered as the Convention A/V Manager. He has been hard at work setting up means by which clinician's content can be pre-loaded on the MER laptops. David has also arranged for 'cloud-based' file transfer and storage of A/V content.

Baltimore Harbor District Layout

Baltimore Harbor District HO Scale Layout by Paul Dolkos



Paul Dolkos is selling his renowned HO Scale Baltimore Harbor District model railroad. Paul's work is inspired by the Fell's Point historic neighborhood. Structures are scratch built or highly modified kits to create the look of Baltimore's waterfront in the 1950's. Notable features include tracks in the street, chemical plants served by a car float and a pier yard area. The track arrangement is designed to support prototype local switch jobs and transfer runs.

A track plan and early description of the railroad first appeared in Model Railroad Planning 2010. Since then the layout has been featured in several magazine stories with the most recent being Great Model Railroads 2021. The current track plan is on the next page. 
The layout presently stands in a 17.5' by 29.5' area. With thoughtful planning, it could be expanded, contracted, or rearranged to fit other spaces.

The layout is sold **"as is"** and the **buyer** will take full responsibility for moving it. The layout is made in 4 sections, each measuring 2 by 12 feet and a staging/yard module that is also 2 by 12 feet with a fold-down wing.


Sections disassemble easily by packing

the buildings and details in bags and boxes and unscrewing the section legs and disconnecting the tracks and wires. While some of the details are fragile, the models themselves are quite sturdy and should withstand a move easily.

layout, all structures, watercraft, vehicles, details as shown in the pictures, and the Easy DCC command station with six throttles used to operate the layout. Also included is a Walthers SW1 switch engine custom painted and lettered for the Canton Railroad and with a sound decoder. No other engines or railroad cars are included. The layout is in Alexandria, Virginia. The asking price for the entire layout is \$18,000.
