

Helping Youth Get On Track

It all started well before 1961...actually, the Choo Choo Barn was originally born in 1945, in the basement of the Groff home on Franklin Street in Strasburg. George Groff had just returned from World War II, and was looking for a Christmas present for his two-year-old son Gary. He found a \$12.50 Lionel train set, and, as any father would do, he helped his son set it up. One thing led to another, and, within a few years, that simple set had begun to take over a larger and larger portion of the family basement.

Word of this train display spread throughout the neighborhood. In the 1950's, the family began opening their now very elaborate display up for townspeople and local school groups during the Christmas holidays. And, as the Groff family grew, so did their basement train display.

Then, in the early 60's, George and Florence needed some extra funds to help pay for college. George noticed a small township maintenance facility — actually, more like a barn — that became available along Route 741, just to the west of the recently reopened Strasburg Rail Road. Perhaps the trains, scenery, buildings, and animated figures in their basement could be used as a part-time business to help with the added financial burden of college expenses. And the rest, as they say, is history.



The Choo Choo Barn, as George decided to call his display, opened on Thanksgiving Day in 1961, and was very quickly a hit with local folks and visitors alike. With over 600 square feet of detailed landscaping, 6 trains, and 6 animated figures, people knew they were seeing something special and unique!

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
On July 29, 2025 a ground-breaking ceremony took place in the rolling stock yard of the Railroad Museum of Pennsylvania. The above photo depicts the roundhouse which will be built adjacent to the Reading Company turntable (already existing). The construction phase marks a journey of almost twenty years to design and build a climate-controlled setting for five iconic PRR steam locomotives.

He showed us how the Choo Choo Barn Foundation is taking model railroading into schools and have the children build their own modules. They learn how to use power tools, how to carve Styrofoam with hot wire, soldering (how many of you shy away from that skill), track laying, ballasting, scenery, etc. Gary and his helpers show the kids how to do it, and then the kids do it themselves. Consequently, the Foundation is swamped with requests to put on their program at other schools. If all goes as planned, Gary will present the Foundation at the MER Philly Express Convention in October.

Yes, I have done a bit of scratchbuilding when I wasn't otherwise occupied in the kitchen or the garage. I continue to make progress on my CRR of NJ Class D9s 4-4-0 camelback. The piping for the dual 9-1/2" air pumps took hours of cutting, fitting, and soldering .015" wire. Yes, I'm crazy.


Division Event

Susquehanna Division Virtual Meet - Saturday, September 27, 2025

All members and any interested guests are welcome to attend our September division meet to be held virtually on Zoom. We will send an invitation link to the members after our August meet at the Railroad Museum of Pennsylvania. If you are not on the Susquehanna Division email notification list, please contact any of the officers for the link to the scheduled Zoom meeting. We have two interesting clinics lined up, so mark your calendars now for Saturday morning, September 27, 2025.

One presentation will be by our own David Smith. He will be talking about doing your own laser cutting. The first step is using graphics software to make the design. The second step is tuning the engraving and cutting parameters to the design and material to assure a successful result from the cut itself. We may be able to organize this presentation to include live video of part of the process in action.

Mike Hauk, the Superintendent of the Alleghany Western Division, Division 12 of the MCR, will give a tutorial on painting Modelu and other 3-D printed figures. Mike will present some techniques that bring out the fine details on these newer generation of 3-D printed figures.



If you are interested in exploring the options with 3-D printed figures here are a couple of links: <u>Modelu</u> is based in the UK, but <u>Yarmouth Model Works</u> distributes their figures in North America. Another source for 3-D printed figures is <u>Miniprints</u>.

Another feature of our membership meets is "Model Showcase" where folks share something they are working on. On Zoom, one of the easiest ways to do this is to share a couple of photos of your project (complete or in process). Photos from your smart phone are fine. Insert them into PowerPoint and have it open on your desktop. Then during the Zoom meeting you can share screen (typically it is a green button at the bottom of your Zoom screen) to discuss what you are work-



ing on with the group. Here are a couple of tips: Make sure your PowerPoint with the photos is open on your desktop *ahead of time*. Choose the PowerPoint when the share screen opens with options. To practice this or any other part of using Zoom, please email dellis@susquehannanmra.org and we can set up a short practice session.

Over the next few years, the display continued to grow, as George added something new each year. In time, his children began to help out, from collecting tickets to adding their own ideas to the growing display. A gift shop was added to the front of the building, and a picnic grove was constructed to the west of the parking lot (free tickets to the grove were available to all Barn visitors). And the display continued to grow...

When the elder Groffs retired in 1979, their youngest son Thomas, and his wife Linda, became the new owners, builders, and operators

of the Choo Choo Barn. In 1983, the second generation business owners opened the

Strasburg Train Shop, a model train hobby shop catering to the "layout builder". Tom says that "detail and originality are what has contributed to the Choo Choo Barn's success and popularity, and other modelers should be able to purchase the same items that are used in the layout." Due to this credo, their train shop has become known far and wide as the place to locate "oddball" things such as garbage cans and the like.

In 1989, Tom & Linda expanded the Choo Choo Barn into a complex of special-ty shops, known as the Shops of Traintown, designed to appeal to everyone. The Groffs opened Railroad Books And Videos, which carries over 600 different books and video tapes devoted to both model railroading and to real trains, along with novelty items, t-shirts, glasses, signs, posters and many other items, all with a train motif. Railroad Books & Videos is also home to a very extensive collection of used trains. Many visitors have commented about being able to find the train they played with when they were young in our cases!



A lot has changed since the days in the Groff family basement. This train layout has grown into an attraction for all ages and all groups...you don't need to be a model railroading enthusiast to enjoy the scenery and animations presented on this display. The display continues to re-open each spring, and Tom Groff and his talented team continue to add, update, clean, renovate, and restore the display, so there's something new to see every year.



In 2023, the reigns of the Choo Choo Barn and the Strasburg Train Shop was handed over to Gary Russell. Being a life -long train collector and with an extensive knowledge in electronics and automation, Gary has the same focus as Tom, and has committed to carrying the Choo Choo Barn legacy forward. We look forward to what the future holds! We are sure you will also.

As Gary began his tenure as the "new" owner of the Choo Choo Barn and the Strasburg Train Shop he envisioned a future whereby youngsters would be exposed to the delights of model railroading. Thus, the "Choo Choo Barn Foundation" was born.

The Foundation has developed educational programs and a community outreach that advances model railroading (especially youth). With educational activities operating in several local school districts and promotional events at city, state and county fairs, the Foundation is spreading the joys of model railroading to young and old alike.

The following is an interview with Gary Russell:

1. Please summarize a brief history of the original Choo Choo Barn including date of origin, creator info, Gary Russell ownership, recent changes.

The **Choo Choo Barn** was born in **1961**, when **George M. Groff**, a World War II veteran and Strasburg resident, transformed an old barn into a model train display to help pay for his son Gary's college tuition. What began as a modest layout with a few Lionel trains and handmade scenery quickly grew into one of the most beloved family attractions in Lancaster County. George's eye for detail and creativity made the Choo Choo Barn stand out—not just as a display of trains, but as a living miniature world full of animation, storytelling, and personality.

Over the years, the attraction became a **family legacy**, with George's children, Gary and Susan, working as its first employees. Eventually, ownership passed to Georges youngest child, **Tom Groff** and most recently to **Gary Russell**, who expanded the layout to over 1,700 square feet, over 185 animations, and ushered in a new era of creativity.

Under Gary's leadership, the Choo Choo Barn grew beyond its original walls to include the formation of the Choo Choo **Barn Foundation**, extending the mission to inspire the next generation of train enthusiasts. In recent years, updates to the display have kept pace with changing times, including refreshed scenery, modern animations, and new educational outreach. The creation of the Mobile Experience, the Music Experience, the new Interactive Experience, and the 5-Week Hands-On Experience, lays at the cornerstone of the Foundation. From its humble begin-



nings in a small barn to its current role as a cornerstone of "Train Town, U.S.A.," the Choo Choo Barn remains a timeless blend of nostalgia, artistry, and innovation.

2. What is the business structure of the Choo Choo Barn divisions (Barn, Hobby Shop and Foundation)?

The **Choo Choo Barn**, **Strasburg Train Shop**, and the **Choo Choo Barn Foundation** together employ a dedicated team of **24 individuals**. The true strength of the company lies in the unique talents and contributions of each team member, whose passion and commitment bring the Choo Choo Barn's mission to life every day.

3. Tell us a little about Gary Russell and his vision for the Choo Choo Barn, Train Shop and Foundation.

Gary Russell became the owner of the **Choo Choo Barn** in 2023, ushering in a new era for one of Strasburg's most beloved landmarks. Though not a member of the Groff family, Gary shares the same passion for model trains, creativity, and community that has always defined the Choo Choo Barn. With a background in leadership and a vision for expanding the impact of the attraction, Gary has already left a strong mark on both the business and its mission.

Under his guidance, the Choo Choo Barn has grown beyond its traditional role as a model train display into a hub for education, imagination, and hands-on learning. Gary authored the children's book *The Great Zoo Adventure*, which brings the magic of the Choo Choo Barn to life for young readers. He also introduced several new initiatives, including the **Mobile Experience**, **Music Experience**, and **Interactive Experience**, each designed to make trains and storytelling more engaging to broader audiences.

Most importantly, Gary established the **Choo Choo Barn Foundation**, which created a **5-week after-school "Hands On" program**. This program is helping students reduce media screen time while building real-world skills in creativity, problem-solving, and craftsmanship.

Gary Russell's vision is clear: to preserve the magic of the Choo Choo Barn while ensuring it continues to grow as a **living, breathing experience** that inspires new generations. By blending tradition with innovation, Gary is carrying the Choo Choo Barn into the future - keeping it a place where imagination always has the right of way.

4. What are the components of the Choo Choo Barn Foundation describing activities for each component?

The **Choo Choo Barn Foundation** is built around four core components, each designed to inspire creativity, reduce screen time, and encourage hands-on learning for children and families.

The Mobile Experience brings the wonder of the Choo Choo Barn directly to schools, libraries, and community events. This traveling exhibit allows children to explore model trains and interactive displays up close, sparking curiosity outside the walls of the museum.

The Music Experience blends sound, rhythm, and storytelling with trains, introducing children to the joy of music as a creative outlet. By combining instruments, songs, and movement, this program encourages kids to make connections between sound and motion, much like the trains on the layout.

The Interactive Experience transforms learning into play by giving children the chance to operate hands-on train controls, animations, and miniature settings. This encourages problem-solving, fine motor skills, and teamwork while letting kids feel like part of the railroad crew.

The 5-Week After-School "Hands On" Program is the heart of the Foundation's mission. This structured program guides children through building projects, model-making, and creative problem-solving activities. Each session emphasizes teamwork, patience, and imagination, helping participants build real-world skills while reducing reliance on digital screens.

Together, these components ensure that the Choo Choo Barn Foundation isn't just about trains—it's about empowering youth with creativity, curiosity, and confidence.



This trailer has been customized to carry a 1924 Wurlitzer Caiola. It is a type of calliope that is powered by electric and has percussion instruments to complement the music which repeats itself every three minutes.

5. Describe the after-school model railroading programs offered at local schools. How can interested seniors volunteer participate in the program?

The Choo Choo Barn Foundation's After-School Model Railroading Program is offered in partnership with local schools, giving students a chance to step away from media screens and discover the excitement of building, designing, and operating their own miniature railroads. Over the course of five weeks, children learn hands-on skills such as track planning, scenery building, wiring, and detailing miniature structures. More importantly, they practice patience, teamwork, and problem-solving while seeing their creative ideas come to life. Each session is designed to balance fun with learning, providing students with both technical knowledge and confidence in their abilities.

Seniors play a vital role in the success of this program. Retirees and train enthusiasts are invited to volunteer as mentors, sharing their skills and life experiences with a new generation. Volunteers may assist in guiding students through projects, teaching basic model railroading techniques, or simply encouraging children as they work. This creates a special opportunity for intergenerational connection, where seniors pass along their love for craftsmanship, storytelling, and railroading while making a lasting impact in their community.

7. Describe the design contest for school children which promotes problem solving and creative thinking.

The Junior High Animation Design Contest is one of the most exciting opportunities offered by the Choo Choo Barn Foundation. Specifically designed for middle school students, the contest invites participants to create original ideas for a new animation that could one day become part of the world-famous Choo Choo Barn layout.

Students are challenged to think like engineers, artists, and storytellers all at once. Each entry must include a sketch or model of the proposed animation, along with a description of how it would move, interact, or add character to the layout. The process encourages problem-solving and creative thinking, as participants must not only dream up a fun idea but also consider how it could realistically be built and operated.

The stakes are high: the winner receives a cash prize and, even more significantly, sees their idea transformed into a real, working animation that will be enjoyed by thousands of visitors to the Choo Choo Barn each year. This unique contest gives students a once-ina-lifetime chance to leave their mark on a beloved landmark, while also inspiring future inventors, engineers, and designers.

NMRA National Convention Awards

Recently, the NMRA National Convention was held in Novi, MI. Alan Mende, the Division's Superintendent, had two scratchbuilt HO models he had constructed and wanted them to be judged at the national level. Since he was unable to attend the convention, David Ellis, a Division Director, volunteered to transport them and enter the model contest representing Alan.

One of the models is a Class A Shay geared locomotive. The Chimney Rock Quarry had a former CNJ Alco HH660 for moving cars. Since Alan likes Shays, he theorized that in earlier times the quarry might have owned a steam locomotive, hence Engine #3 was lettered for the Chimney Rock Quarry. This scratch-built brass engine was awarded the Chairman's Award. This model won Second Place with a score of 112 out of 125 points.

The other HO model is an 0-4-0T tank locomotive. Engine #840 was a Jersey Central Lines small switcher first used at the Bronx Terminal and later as the Communipaw Shop switcher. This model won First Place in the Scratch Built Steam Locomotive category with a score of 122 out of 125 points and also the Judge's Award.



Amtrak has wrapped a pair of ACS-64 locomotives in Crayola-inspired "Creativity on the Go" schemes in a nod to the iconic crayon manufacturer.

ACS-64 No. 621 wears a violet blue livery that features eight crayon colors that Crayola recently brought out of retirement. No. 620 is wrapped in Crayola's dandelion, a golden yellow shade.

The locomotives are part of a summer promotion: Kids ride free on the Auto Train and can take advantage of free admission to Crayola Experience locations.

CLIFTON FORGE, Va. (WVVA) - A group has announced the purchase of and plans to restore a <u>historic steam locomotive</u> that once ran through Summers, Raleigh and Fayette Counties.

<u>RJD America LLC</u> announced in a November press release that they have purchased Chesapeake & Ohio 614 steam locomotive and plan on restoring it back to operation. The locomotive and its auxiliary tender will be restored at the <u>Strasburg Rail Road Mechanical Services shops.</u>

In Strasburg, work will be done to make sure 614 and its tender meet operational and safety standards, as well as retain its historical authenticity. The Strasburg Rail Road shops are acclaimed for restoring historic rail equipment, and for its team of expert craftsmen and engineers.

Jason Johnson, General Manager and Communications Director for RJD America, said they are honored to take on this project.

"Reviving 614 goes beyond restoring machinery; it's about reigniting the magic of steam railroading for today's and tomorrow's enthusiasts." Johnson said. "We are privileged to become its caretakers."

The company said once the restoration is done, it will run wherever its new owners decide is appropriate, and according to the 614 website, no specific plans have been announced but the likely outcome is that 614 will be used for excursions and appear at special rail events.

According to the 614 website, restoration will take about 2 years from when the restoration starts and the project is being funded privately.

The Chesapeake & Ohio 614 was built by Lima Locomotive Works in 1948, and is a J-3a 'Greenbrier' class 4-8-4 locomotive, and was built to pull passenger trains and freight trains. The locomotive was designed to handle the mountains in Virginia and West Virginia, and pulled the C&O's most famous passenger trains such as the 'Fast Flying Virginian' and the 'George Washington.'

Pulling these passenger trains took the 614 to places like Washington D.C., Richmond, and included stops in Hinton, Prince, Thurmond, and Charleston on its way to Cincinnati.

614 was retired in 1952, and was restored for the first time in 1976.

Being the only surviving locomotive of its type, it was preserved and pulled excursion trains before being retired again. The 614 was also proposed to be the locomotive to pull the Greenbrier Resort Presidential train, a project that never ended up happening.

The 614 was housed in Clifton Forge, Virginia where iit was prepped for the move to Strasburg, PA. RJD America LLC specializes in restoring and operating historic locomotives, and the company said their goals are to educate and inspire future generations about the role of railroads in shaping American history.



Jim Mattern displayed a kitbashed Westerfield kit for a Cornwall RR ore car; Kevin Macomber showed and discussed a scratchbuilt O scale house that is a finalist for the PA Museum. Jim Cabie discussed construction of his beautiful Randolph RR station while Phil Peters brought a really complex scratchbuild of Elwell's Bar in N scale. Rich Wurst showed a creative flat car load that he scratchbuilt totally from imagination. Robert Schildt closed out the showcase with kitbashed Lionel conversions in both O standard and O 42" narrow gauge, the latter using a Flyer mechanism.


